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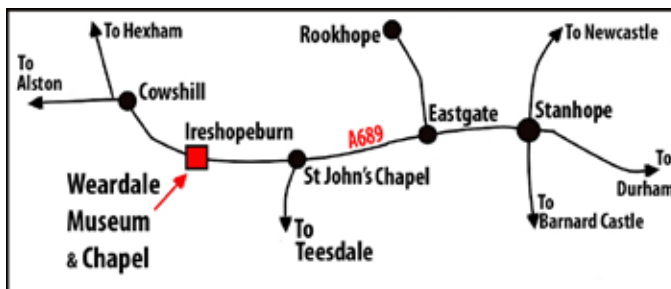

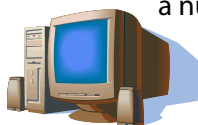
Perhaps the Weardale Museum at Ireshopeburn can help.

Although the Durham County Record Office (www.durhamrecordoffice.org.uk) is the custodian of an unrivalled collection of genealogy resources for the whole of County Durham, the Weardale Museum has focussed its attention on the local geographical region and can offer a unique and powerful resource — fully computer-searchable transcripts of the complete census of the Parishes of Wolsingham and Stanhope (all of Weardale from Wolsingham in the east to Killhope in the west) for all of the census years 1841 to 1911.

The computerised census files, which altogether amount to more than 80,000 records, are in spreadsheet format and very easily searchable by a number of useful fields — surname,

forenames, residence, birthplace, occupation, etc. — so that, for example, in the 1841 census all

214 Pearts in Stanhope Parish Forest Quarter can be displayed in a matter of seconds.



To complement the census files and to extend our records back into the 18th century, we have recently added transcripts of some of the Wolsingham, Stanhope & St John's Chapel Parish Registers, which record baptisms, marriages and burials. These files too are fully computer-searchable in spreadsheet format. This on-going project will be extended to cover other periods and other parishes.

A third major data-source available to the family historian is our fully indexed transcripts of the gravestones of Weardale, encompassing 12 graveyards, more than 4000 memorials, and almost 8000 named individuals.

Data from these three main sources — censuses, parish registers, and gravestone inscriptions — have been brought together into our formidable genealogical database, “Weardale People”, which we run on a well-known commercial family history program, and which currently contains over 64,000 individuals whose family relationships can be displayed as ancestor charts or descendant trees.

For those visitors who are not comfortable with computers, we hold many of our records in printed paper format.



All of our stewards are volunteers so, if help and guidance is required to navigate and examine

the computer files, it is advisable to make an appointment with one of our expert helpers (Ken Tel. 01388 517208, (Eric) Tel. 01388 528085 or (David) Tel. 01388 517433).

And if you are doing your research from a distance we may be able to conduct searches for you.
